
## **Fred Hardyway—Faculty Representative**

His dissertation project is tentatively entitled *Vesterheim in Red, White, and Blue: Becoming Norwegian-American in the Pacific Northwest*. This project builds upon his MA-paper from Montana State University, "The First and the Sixth Pearl Harbor: Norwegian-American Identity at the Onset of World War II." He published the paper "When the Beast Saved the Day and Yellow Jack Got Lost: The Story of General Butler and the Yellow Fever Epidemic That Never Took Place" in the spring 2012 issue of the *Southern Historian*, and presented the paper "August Werner: An Ambassador of Norwegian Culture and a Model U.S. Citizen?" at the 2014 Pacific Northwest History Conference. During the 2013/2014 academic year, he was a Fellow of the American-Scandinavian Foundation and the Norway House Foundation, and in the summer of 2014, he taught HIST 314 American Roots: Immigration, Migration, and Ethnic Identity on the Vancouver campus.

- Pick out material from the library in the language and leave it with the language professor
- Pay the \$90 charge at French Admin
- Take the exam

Last year, there were more requests than colloquia, so make sure to get your requests in early!




## New Graduate Adviser
